For that reason, perhaps, this year's *Circular* seems like a more important document than ever, as it gives us a chance to celebrate all of those good things that we have enjoyed together as a school in the face of all these challenges.

These pages are brimming over with stories of endeavour, achievement and success, both inside the classroom and out.

Frustratingly, we were in the midst of possibly the most successful year of sport in the school's history. Our hockey team had qualified for the finals of the IAPS national tournament for the fourth year in a row and we felt they had the best chance of all of the teams who have got to this stage of going on and winning the overall title. We will never know what they might have done but we are proud of their achievements nevertheless, as we are of all of the sports boys and girls who have represented the school with such enthusiasm in the year gone by. It was also a great year for Music and Drama with unprecedented success in ABRSM and LAMDA exams a good representation of the enormously high standards that have been set.

This year we have said goodbye to two members of staff with a long association with the school who have both made enormous contributions in their different ways. Alice Wren, the daughter of the former headmaster, Mr Ian Wren, relocated to Cardiff with our very best wishes after many years of service as a much-loved teaching assistant. I have already mentioned the success of our sports teams and much of the credit for this must go to our Games master Matt Phillips, who also left the school after 12 years of service. We also said goodbye to longstanding trustee and volunteer Pat Lines. We welcome to the school this year Mark

Adkins as our new Head of Digital Learning and Helen Plenderleith who will teach Art in the upper school. We hope that both of these new teachers take the school to their hearts, in the way that their predecessors most certainly did.

In the classroom this year, we focused on the impact that targeted feedback can make on children's learning. The right input at the right time can spur a child on to achieve their next steps and move forward with their learning. Much progress was made in this area and we continue to focus on this again for 2020-21, as well as asking the children to self-regulate their work and make sure that they are putting the teachers' feedback into practice on a daily basis.

At the top end of the school we had an exceptional year of success with entrance exams, where more than 70% of our children achieved the pass mark for the 11+ and we more than doubled our number of scholarship offers at Princethorpe College. Despite the lockdown, we all enjoyed the opportunity to say a fond farewell to our Year 6 pupils at their end of year service on the field. I should also thank the contribution that the Friends of Crescent made to this event, as well as so many

others that they have generously supported, with the help of our wonderful parents, throughout the year that has gone by.

The Circular is always a source of great pride for the teachers and staff here. I do hope you all enjoy reading it.

Attainment Report Pre-Prep 2019-20

This year has proved to be another very happy and successful year for the children in Pre-Prep.

e continue, each day, to welcome happy children who love school and who strive to be good friends, good learners and good citizens. This year above all others they have demonstrated a resilience and application we are so proud of. We believe that these starting points enable children to be the best they can be across and beyond the curriculum.

- In Reception 94% of Crescent children attained a 'good level of development'. The national average is 72%. This data is based upon the children achieving the expected level of development across 12 key Early Learning Goals (they include Communication and Language; Physical Development; Personal Social Emotional; Literacy; Mathematics and Expressive Art and Design). The average national point score is 34.6, at Crescent it is 40.5.
- In Year 1 85% of children met or exceeded expectations in Reading, 80% in Writing, 90% in Maths and 85% Science.
- Our Year 2 children have also continued to thrive. In Reading 90%, Writing 90%, Maths 90% and Science 95% of children met or exceeded national expectations.

We are very proud of the huge amount of work that children, parents and staff put into this.

In terms of exceeding age expectations:

- · 39% of Reception children exceeded expectations in Reading, 33% in Writing and 33% in Maths
- In Year 1 in Reading 40% of children exceeded national expectations, 25% in Writing, in Maths 30% and Science 40% .
- In Year 2 50% of children exceeded age expectations in Reading and Maths. 35% in Writing and 25% in Science.

Upper School Academic Achievement

e say goodbye this year to another wonderful Year 6. They have been a joy to work with as they have made their way through the school.

We pride ourselves at the Crescent on putting the child first when it comes to secondary school placements. We had another very successful year, preparing and helping children to get to their senior school of choice. The work starts very much as soon as the children start school but becomes increasingly focused from Year 4 with 'Thinking Skills' lessons and exam preparation in Maths and English; but alongside this the wellbeing of the children remains at the front of our minds as we work closely with their families to identify the school where they will flourish.

Over 70% of the children who took the 11+ were offered a place for a grammar school.

97% of the children who sat entrance exams for independent schools were offered a place. 18 children are going to Princethorpe College

The following scholarships were awarded across the year group:

- 3 Music scholarships
- Art scholarships
- Sports scholarship
- All-rounders scholarships
- Academic scholarship

This has been an outstanding year. The contributory factors are smaller classes and Teaching Assistants working with the classes. 'Thinking Skills' lessons in preparation and teachers teaching the class for Year 5 and 6 in preparation for exams, through Brain Training at the start of the year, mock exams, holiday work sent home at key times and PSHE time to offer support.

We have been delighted with how this year's class has performed and we wish them all the best of luck in their senior schools and future endeavours

Measuring Reception

In Maths the children learned about simple capacity. We talked about terms like 'full' 'half full' and 'empty'. We enjoyed playing in the water and exploring which containers hold the most liquid. We also used non-standard units of measurement to investigate 'Who is the tallest in the class?

The Hungry Caterpillar

The children study French in Reception and enjoy learning new words. Over a number of weeks, Reception children studied the Very Hungry Caterpillar. They had great fun making jigsaw puzzles and naming some of the food the hungry caterpillar eats in French

They learned to name the main elements of the story, from the caterpillar to the butterfly via the cocoon, and the food it eats, all in French. The children then made their own miniature version of the book, drawing the pictures and sequencing the pages.

They then investigated hibernation and had fun exploring and describing ice. They compared hot and cold places and the role play area took on the shape of an igloo as the children become Arctic explorers!

Once Upon a Time

In the Trinity term we started a new topic – 'Once Upon a Time' - and our first focus story was 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears'. In our home learning we had fun with an online version of the tale and wrote personal responses to the story. We also wrote apology letters to the bears!

Then we moved on to the 'Three Little Pigs' and the children were asked to create a painting, picture or collage of the pigs' houses for their work in Expressive Art and Design. We were delighted with the effort that the class went to – there were some superb pictures.

And no one in Reception was afraid of the Big Bad Wolf - although we did discover that he really isn't a very nice character. So the children thought of adjectives to describe the wolf and recognised that he doesn't show any of the qualities of a good citizen unlike the children of Crescent School. The children then made pictures, masks or puppets of the wolf. All sorts of wonderful wolf creations were produced and lots of fine motor skills practised. 


Leap into limericks!

Science Studies



DISCOVERING TUTANKHAMUN'S TOMB

This open learning activity really allowed the children's creativity to flow and let them explore aspects of the topic which they were particularly interested in. The results were wonderful and the children enjoyed sharing their creations with their class.

Science Insulators

Year 5 investigated how insulators kept a potato warm. They chose their favourite insulator to cover one of the potatoes and recorded how quickly that one and the control took to cool down. They presented the results in line graphs and were able to draw conclusions from their findings.

Maths Weighing Skills

Year 5 enjoyed improving their weighing skills in Maths. With little input, they had to decide what intervals all the different weighing scales measured in and then record the weights of classroom objects in grams and kilograms.

Weight and Measure at Home

The children then improved their measuring skills using both metric and imperial measures. At home they measured the same amount of capacity, weight and length using different equipment and different scales. An excellent practical application of important life skills.

ADDITION OF DECIMALS

Year 5 showed progress in working with decimals by creating a selection of their own questions. They were able to apply their skills to addition with the aid of Post It notes!. They used each other's numbers in their calculations and then feedback to each other to see if they were both correct or not.

How tall is Year 5?

The children were asked the question: How tall is our class?

They were then given five minutes planning time and half an hour to find the accurate answer in metres. Various pieces of measuring equipment and recording materials were available. After a little discussion the class tackled the open learning problem without help from their teachers.

They recorded the whole class' heights and applied addition skills and established that together the class measured a 35.68m!

HOUSEBUILDERS

A two-week DT project had Year 5 building houses. Having found out about the different types of houses and different houses through the ages, they set about designing a house of their dreams. They drew out plans and set to work making them out of cardboard. Rooms were decorated with wallpaper, carpet and furniture and little toys were added to see if they would fit! Some of them must have taken hours to make!

We then went on to use our knowledge of multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000 to convert between measures.

It is traditional to hide a small charm in the cake (called a 'fève') and the person who finds the 'fève' in their slice is the King or Queen for the day

Mr Hester's STEAM Challenge

Year 6 welcomed Foundation Head, Ed Hester, in February for a special STEAM Challenge. Mr Hester began by stressing the importance of the STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) subjects to the modern world. He shared with the children how they run through all our lives and how, as pupils of the Foundation, they could embrace STEAM to forge their own futures.

He then tested their STEAM knowledge. Working in groups he asked the pupils a series of questions on a wide range of topics, from binary to bones, scientists to stars to the speed of light and even mind-boggling optical illusions, the children all enjoyed puzzling out the answers. After the quiz Mr Hester set them one further design challenge. Using just tape, scissors and index cards, pupils worked together to build a free-standing tower. The children all took different approaches, testing out structures and the towers began to grow. In just ten minutes many were reaching lofty heights, with the

tallest finally measuring in at over 70cm. It was a lot of fun!



3D SHAPES

In November, Year 6 investigated 3D shapes and nets. The open learning task allowed the children to choose their own path and activity; ranging from constructing nets out of 'Klikko' to using their geometry skills to draw and make their own nets.



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Reading uperstars

Daniel - Nine Million words and still counting



Last year, Crescent School pupil, Daniel Ovens Gibbs, read an impressive six million words and 65 books.

This year 11-year-old Daniel has gone one step better. As we approached the last weeks of the summer term, Daniel broke through the nine million words mark after reading an astonishing 106 books during the school year.

Daniel is modest about his achievement saying, "I love reading - it takes me into a world of adventure and stimulates my imagination. My favourite time to read is in the evening; it helps me wind down after the day." Some of Daniel's favourite reads this year have included, 'The Return of Sherlock Holmes', 'The Earthsea Saga' (series of books) and 'The Lantern Bearers' - all great mystery and adventure stories full of drama and suspense to captivate their reader.

Outside of school, Daniel reads most days but, just like any other boy, he also plays sports such as hockey, tennis and sailing and finds time to practise the piano and flute.



Determined not to be outdone Daniel's younger brother Drew got in on the act too. By the end of the year, Year 4 pupil, Drew had clocked up over 4 million words.

Assistant Head, Sarah Webb, who leads on literacy at the Crescent School, explains, "We have a very positive reading culture here at Crescent, it is cool for boys to read,

many of our boys in Year 6 have the reading age of a 16-year-old. There are just so many good books out there for boys to read these days. Pupils from Year 3 onwards take part in the reading challenge and can quiz daily on the computers before school. We find the boys respond really well to the competitive nature of the challenge. Daniel has been our top reader for several years, but it is an absolutely awe-inspiring achievement that he read nine million words during the year."



Accelerated Reader builds a strong reading ethic

Reading is so important for children, supporting the development of their language and literacy skills as well as enabling their imaginations and helping to enrich their lives.

The Crescent's approach to literacy is supported by Renaissance's Accelerated Reader system. Children take a quiz after reading each book that tests their understanding. Its approach promotes reading for pleasure whilst ensuring the children read appropriately challenging books. It also totals up the books and

The school has such a strong reading ethic that you might be amazed by just how many words are read. During 2019-20 the children in each year group read:

Year 3 - over 3 million words Year 4 - over 24 million words Year 5 - over 17 million words Year 6W - over 28 million words Year 6Y - over 19 million words

Across the school 30 children read over 1 million words, and a few read many many more! Daniel read over 9 million, Matthew read over 6 million and Harry B and Matthew T read over 5 million.

Zahra zoomed through the library

Year 3 pupil, Zahra has developed a wide vocabulary and understanding of grammar, from her love of reading. From fact to fiction, from classics to comedy, Zahra devoured 143 books during the school year, with an astonishing quizzing average She was also able to complete 34 vocabulary quizzes which fed into her day to day of 97% writing and her superbly structured story writing.



Whizz-ard Kid Ellie nearly read two million words

Year 3, Ellie is a simply, sensational reader and at the age of 8-years-old she finished JK Rowling's Harry Potter series. In just three months Ellie devoured the wonderful wizarding stories, that can often be found on the reading lists for children in secondary school.

On Accelerated Reader Ellie quizzed on all the books achieving an average pass rate of 90% which is way above the target set by her teacher Sam Stapleton. Whizz-ard kid Ellie read so many words during lockdown that she was close to becoming a double millionaire.

Ellie's reading achievement was amazing, and we were all super impressed with her wizardry literacy skills.

Five Ways to Wellbeing

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An important initiative in school this year has been the development of our Wellbeing programme. We held our first Wellbeing Day in February, where we introduced to the children the importance of emotional and mental health. There was a real buzz around the school as the children engaged with all the different activities.

The day began with an assembly where we shared how we as a school are planning to provide space and resources to help everyone and then the children all took part in a carousel of activities relating to the five ways of 'Wellbeing' as identified by the NHS and the Mental Health Foundation.

The children enjoyed the sessions that helped them Connect, Learn, be Active, take Notice and Give - or C.L.A.N.G. for short!

Our first Wellbeing Day was well planned, well executed and well received by everyone!

We were encouraged by the engagement of the children and their ability to understand and reflect on their own lives. Each child collected stickers during the day and then created an action plan to make changes for the better and they are all looking forward to another Wellbeing Day next year.
